SHIFTING OF ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICES ON THE ESTATE

The Theosophical Publishing House (TPH) was moved from its location in Besant Gardens to the Vasanta Press building in Sri Ram Colony, in order to accommodate the upcoming Adyar Theosophical Academy (ATA), a newly started theosophical school.

To accommodate the TPH office in the premises of the Vasanta Press, a number of modifications to the building had to be carried out. The hall on the northern side of the Press which housed the post print machinery (for cutting, stitching and binding) had to be moved out and this hall was then converted into the TPH sales office. To do this, the flooring had to be redone with new floor tiles, the walls had to be scraped and repainted and the electrical wiring had to be replaced completely, along with the installation of new electrical fittings. In addition, there were repairs done to the godown, renovation and repainting of the room on the western side for use as the TPH dispatch room and upgradation of all the toilets in the building. Once the civil works were completed, large wooden cupboards and shelves with books from the erstwhile TPH had to be transported to the new location in the Vasanta Press building. This project was completed by 31 March 2019 and a puja was

held on 6 April 2019 to mark the occasion. Some more work remains to be done — such as the provision of ladders to reach the roof area and repairs and painting of the outer walls of the building. Presently, with the printing press and the publishing house located in the same building, there is greater coordination and ease of functioning.

Offices were shifted in the TS main compound as well. While there was an interchange of the respective offices of the international Treasurer, Nancy Secrest, and the General Manager, K. Jaikumar, across floors in the Administrative Building, the international Secretary, Marja Artamaa, moved to a larger room in the same building on the ground floor.

Marja had been functioning from a small corner room in the northwestern side. But since her work required her to meet with a large number of TS members, officials and dignitaries, it was decided that she could work from the larger records room. In this room, while many cupboards containing old documents and files were shifted to the first floor, a few glass-fronted, wooden cupboards,

containing several thousand, handwritten, membership cards from the early 1900s to the 1980s, continue to remain in the office, imparting a whiff of a bygone era to the Secretary's chamber! The new office is more airy and spacious and has a comfortable meeting area for holding discussions. A small puja to inaugurate the move to the new office was held on 7 December 2018.

EASTER CONFERENCE

The 96th Easter Conference was held at Adyar from 19-21 April 2019 on 'The Real Purpose of the Theosophical Society'. The prescribed book for study was Theosophy as the Masters See It by Clara M. Codd, and the venue was the recently renovated Blavatsky Bungalow. The Conference was hosted by the Kerala Theosophical Federation (KTF). Dr M. A. Raveendran, President of the KTF, welcomed the gathering. The international President, Mr Tim Boyd, presided, and said that the real mission of the Theosophical Society (TS) is 'to serve humanity by cultivating an ever-deepening understanding and realization of the Ageless Wisdom, spiritual self-transformation, and the unity of all life.' He added that: 'We should realize this Mission during the Easter Conference when the spiritual power all over the world is rising to redeem humanity from the limitations of matter.'

Ms Nancy Secrest, international Treasurer, then inaugurated the Conference. She pointed out that Codd's book was very relevant even sixty-six years after its first publication, because Universal Brotherhood is not an idle phrase, but a fact in Nature. Dr N. C. Ramanujachary started the discussions with 'Why the Masters founded the Theosophical Society'. He said: 'They did not want the TS to become a cult. The TS is principle-oriented and not person-oriented, and it spreads the value of occult truths in the daily life of man.' In the afternoon, there were

two short talks — 'Religion vs Superstition' by Mr Krishnamurti and 'Science is our Best Ally' by Dr Raveendran.

The second and the third day of the Conference saw the delivery of a number of interesting talks: Latent Powers beyond Science (Ms H. Sripriya); Yoga, Practical Realization (Ms Sandhya Rani), What are the Things to be Discussed? (Dr R. Revathy); New Avenues of Work (Ms Upasika Maithreya); Towards Unification (Ms Marja Artamaa); Dogma, Authority, and Discipline (Mr K. Dinakaran); short talks on Loyalty, Discretion, and Zeal; The People the Master Wants (Mr N. C. Krishna); Hindrances on the Way (Ms Vijayalaxmi); and Joy of the Way (Mr C. Nandakumar). The session came to an end with concluding remarks by Mr S. Harihara Raghavan, Advisor to President and vote of thanks by Mr K. Dinakaran, Secretary, KTF.

THEOSOPHICAL WORKERS' TRAINING CAMP

A Theosophical Workers' Training Camp was held at Adyar during 12–26 May 2019. It was inaugurated by the international Secretary, Ms Marja Artamaa. The Director of the Camp, Dr N. C. Ramanujachary, then gave an outline of the study proposed to be undertaken during the two weeks. Incidentally, the expenses of the training programme were met from a fund created by Dr C. R. Kamath

of Chennai, a long standing member of the TS, since 1959.

Twenty-five participants attended the programme from different parts of India – Chennai, Maharashtra, Andhra, Karnataka, other parts of Tamil Nadu and Uttar Pradesh.

The topics covered during the training programme included: Theosophy and the Theosophical Society, the purpose of

establishing the Society, its basic principles and policies, the work of the Founders, past presidents and leaders, the work of the Lodges, responsibilities of members, constitution of the human body and many other topics. Special stress was laid on studying the Mission Statement and the latest 2019 resolution of the General Council on Freedom and Responsibility of the Lodges and branches.

LEADBEATER CHAMBERS RENOVATION

Leadbeater Chambers (LBC), which is over a hundred years old, and has the distinction of being the first concrete building put up in Chennai, is proposed to be taken up for major renovation in 2019. Prior to undertaking this renovation, the structural soundness of the existing LBC structure had to be evaluated by a well-known structural consulting firm. This evaluation exercise concluded that the vintage LBC building is definitely undergoing 'distress', with cracks on the inner and outer wall surfaces, structural column cracks, corrosion in most pillars/columns, damaged/ cracked balusters and railings in the balconies, concrete shrinkage due to ageing, water leakage/ seepage through the walls, and so on. Hence, a comprehensive structural rehabilitation programme for the LBC building was recommended. This work is currently in

progress with two specialized contractors, having prior experience in rehabilitating distressed concrete buildings, having been commissioned to undertake the work. This project is likely to be completed by the end of August 2019 and the interior remodelling/renovation work will commence around the same time.

LARGE ANIMAL REFUGE

The Besant Memorial Animal Dispensary (BMAD) has a new facility for rescued large animals. This beautiful refuge is located in the *Sapota Thottam*, the orchard area of the TS estate that has a number of fruit trees, like sapota, mango, jackfruit, gooseberry, coconut, drumstick, lemon bushes and many more. It is a verdant, quiet and beautiful space for our animals who spend their time peacefully grazing, basking in the sunshine and being pampered by the attenders and volunteers. Currently the sanctuary provides refuge to

four donkeys (two adults and two foals), a cow, two calves, four pigs, a horse, a goat, a ram and four bulls. Also busy pecking on the ground, are five snow white cockerels with brilliant red combs, which strut around pompously, crowing at all hours of the day, much to the amusement of all. Barring the four bulls which have been retired from garden work in the TS, all the other animals have been rescued from slaughter or from extremely harsh and abusive environments from various parts of the city.

The Purple Sunbird (*Cinnyris asiaticus*) is a common bird of the woodlands and urban gardens.
