ADYAR DAY

On 17 February every year we celebrate Adyar Day. As in the earlier years, students from the Olcott Memorial Higher Secondary School (OMHSS) came in a procession, carrying a portrait of Col. H. S. Olcott, stopped at the portico of the Headquarters building to sing a song, and together with the children from the Social Welfare Centre (SWC), paid their respects to the founding President who passed from this world on this day in 1907. For this special occasion, the SWC children were thrilled to be wearing new dresses, gifted to them by the TOS, Adyar, on 14 February 2020.

The meeting commenced with opening remarks by the international Secretary, Ms Marja Artamaa, who then invited Ms Jaishree Kannan to sing the song of Adyar. An English translation of the same was handed over to the audience before the commencement of the programme. Four speakers who had been invited for the function, were warmly welcomed by Ms Artamaa. The first speaker was Mrs Clemice Petter, who spoke on the vital importance of Adyar—as a place for those who are thirsty for the truth—to understand and discover what lies beyond the veil of ignorance in which most

of us live. The next speaker was Mrs Catalina Isaza, a new resident of the campus, who gave her impressions on Adyar. Mr Shikhar Agnihotri was the third speaker, and spoke about Col. Henry Steel Olcott's will of steel, and illustrated his talks with very interesting anecdotes from Col. Olcott's life before he joined Madame H. P. Blavatsky in founding the Theosophical Society. The last speaker was Mr Sankara Saktananda, a scholar in the Adyar Library, who spoke on the teachings of J. Krishnamurti in the light of the Bhagavad-gita.

The function ended with the offering of flowers to the Founders by the participants. The main hall was kept open till noon for those who felt the need to meditate in silence and reverence. Books by Col. Olcott, J. Krishnamurti and C. W. Leadbeater, were made available for reading in the Headquarters Hall.

SHIFTING OF THE ARCHIVES

The Adyar Archives was set up on 17 February 1922, and has a long and hoary history. The preserved material in the Archives is extremely precious and historically very important. Besides diaries and scrapbooks, the collection includes original letters, manuscripts, personal belongings, travel mementos, photographs, gifts, and audio and video cassettes, of various theosophical leaders.

Despite the beauty of the location of the Archives in the Headquarters Hall, on the banks of the Adyar River, the ever present moisture in the air, and the resultant fungus, proved to be a great danger to the precious documents stored there. Also, there was the risk of flood water entering the building during the monsoon. Keeping all this in mind, the Archives was moved to the building housing our sister institution, the

Adyar Library. This move would make many researchers happy because one need not run from one place to another for sourcing a reference. It saves time and energy and facilitates greater ease of functioning.

On 25 January, there was a formal inauguration function by the President, Mr Tim Boyd, and the Archives was named 'Surendra Narayan Archives' after the former Vice President of the Theosophical Society, Mr Surendra Narayan, who passed on recently. His family had donated generously to the Archives and it is a fitting tribute to this very fine theosophist whose life was an inspiration and example for others, to have the Archives named after him.

HEADQUARTERS HALL GARDEN RENOVATION PROJECT

Since the Headquarters Hall is an iconic and revered building for theosophists all over the world, it is important that it should have an equally appealing garden in front of it! For many years now, the grassy patch in front of the Hall has been in urgent need of care, development and beautification.

So when Dr Gautam Narasimhan, who

had spent his childhood in the TS, and is now based in the US, came forward with a novel project proposal — that is, not only would he donate / fund the entire cost of creating a beautiful green space, but he would also fund the annual recurring cost of maintaining the same — TS Adyar, wholeheartedly accepted this proposal. Gautam wanted to

create a living memorial for his late wife, Smt. Medha Gautam, by setting up and nurturing this beautiful garden.

This project — named HQ Hall Garden project — envisaged the removal of the top soil surface layer, refilling it with red earth and then planting pre-grown lawn grass over the entire garden area. A number of flowering plants are to be planted along the border and in clusters within the lawn area. Pathways are to be paved with granite slabs and the pond in the middle of the garden is to be renovated. Two sculptures — one bronze lamp and another granite sculpture depicting 'turiya' or 'pure consciousness', in abstract form — are planned to be installed in the northern and south-eastern end of the garden.

Work on this garden has already begun.

Notable is her contribution as Editor of *Brahma-Vidya*, the Adyar Library Bulletin, Vols. 81 and 82 in 2017 and 2018, and Vol. 83 in 2019.

RARE MANUSCRIPTS DISCOVERED AT THE ADYAR LIBRARY RESEARCH CENTRE (ALRC)

Sri Sadasiva Brahmendra was an eighteenth century saint, mystic, music composer and Advaita philosopher, who had produced great works of philosophy and Carnatic music compositions. His *Atmavidya-vilasa* (Living in the Knowledge of the Self) is considered to be a masterpiece on *Advaita*.

Two of his unpublished works were accidentally discovered by Sankara Saktananda, a research scholar working at the ALRC. As the palmleaf manuscripts had been written in the ancient Telugu language in the *Grantha* script, a lot of time had to be spent in deciphering the manuscripts and translating them.

The **Coppersmith Barbet** or **Crimson-breasted Barbet** (*Megalaima haemacephala*) is a bird with a crimson forehead and throat which is best known for its metronomic call that has been likened to a coppersmith striking metal with a hammer. They chisel out a hole inside a tree to build their nest and are mainly frugivorous.

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
